NCDAA ANNUAL SESSION AWARDS

THE EDNA ZEDAKER LOYAL ASSISTANT AWARD, sponsored by the Past President's Council, will be presented to the member of NCDAA present at Annual Session Awards Ceremony, who submits the longest record of consecutive employment, with one employer, providing she has not previously received the award. (The term of consecutive employment shall refer to an assistant actually employed by, but not married to her employer). A notorized statement giving the date of original employment and stating that she has been a member of the NCDAA for at least 2 years must be given to NCDAA Secretary of her society. It must be signed by her employer and the President and Secretary of her local society. It must be 2 consecutive years just prior to application of the award, that he or she has been a member of NCDAA.

THE WILLIAM H. OLIVER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD, sponsored by Linda W. Clark, will be presented to the member, who in the opinion of the Executive Board has done the most outstanding work for NCDAA and for dental assistants.

THE ETHEL EARL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD, sponsored by the Family of Faye J. Watkins, will be presented to a member of the NCDAA, not on the Executive Committee, who in the opinion of the Executive Board has done the most outstanding work for the Association and for dental assistants.

THE CHARLOTTE LABORATORY AWARD will be presented to the society having the largest percentage of members registered at the Annual Session.

Secretary, Joyce Baker called the roll and a quorum was present to conduct business.

Correspondence was presented by President Sell. One of the things she brought to our attention was sending cards to our Military. Nanette had brought cards for those present to sign and be sent. President Sell also expressed her appreciation to each one who participated in the NCDS Missions of Mercy this year. She gave a brief review of the Missions of Mercy at Kill Devil Hills.

President Sell informed us that her report from Annual Session will be on the website and also in the next issue of the Mirror.

Standing Committee Reports:

Judicial & Legislative – Deana Billings reported that on behalf of this committee she corresponded with Nancy Fetter, Cape Fear Community College, Dr. Gary Oyster, Legislative Chair of NCDS, and Dr. Bob Plage, NC Dental Society Board of Trustees and Chairman of the ADA Delegation, concerning discussions with NCDS in regards to Expanded Functions Dental Assistant training programs and access to care. Ms. Fetter said one of her recommendations was that this program be offered only to dental assistants that already have experience of working in a dental office. They would go back for additional training. She said this was discussed with the administration at CFCC, however, is waiting on unanswered questions and support from the North Carolina Dental Society.



Dr. Plage said he felt like the Dental Society was definitely interested in more discussions, however, they had been tied up with assuming control of the MOM project. He also felt NCDS was waiting on ADA and what position they would take nationally

However, he and Dr. Oyster did say that a letter from NCDAA to Dr. Robert Hollowell, President-Elect, would be a great next step. They suggested we write the letter and send it before January, which is when the next NCDS Trustee Meeting will be held. Deana believes that NCDAA needs to restate our official position and give them the names of our members that was appointed to that Special Task Force by Past President, Dianne Gwaltney, last year. That committee consists of Dianne Gwaltney, Charyl Allison and Lynda Snider. Deana Billings was also asked to join this NCDAA Task Force. This committee will continue to monitor the progress regarding EFDA.

DENTAL ASSISTING: A REWARDING CAREER

Dental assisting is a misunderstood profession. If you ask most people they will say that the dental assistant "helps the dentist" or "cleans teeth". Not too many people realize the extent of the dental assistant's responsibilities in the dental office. A dental practice is made up several individuals who work together as a team to provide comprehensive dental care for the patient. Each person has certain responsibilities that enhance and compliment the other members of the team. The practice runs smoothly when each individual does his or her job well and understands his or her role as a vital part of the office. The dental assistant is a very important member of the team.

Dental assistants are usually the first people with whom patients interact when contacting a dental office. Dental receptionists are dental assistants since their job requires that they know the dental procedures and how much time is needed to schedule for each procedure. Dental assistants take office practice management courses, which train them in public relations, computer software skills, accounting, and insurance filing. Dentists are looking for a person who likes people and has a pleasant personality with a smile in his or her voice, because this person determines the prospective patient's first impression of the office.

Most people are not too pleased about visiting a dentist. They are apprehensive about the procedures. A dental assistant's job requires him or her to be able to calm and reassure nervous and anxious patients. The dental assistant needs to understand the procedures and be able to explain how they will be done in simple, non-threatening terms. He or she needs to be a teacher as well as a counselor to each patient.

The dental assistant is the person who ensures that the instruments used in a dental office are sterile and prepared for each procedure. He or she cleans and disinfects the room after the procedures to prepare for the next patient. A large part of the job is to prevent cross-contamination between patients or between patients and the employees of the dental office. Dental assistants provide dentists two extra hands by sitting and working chairside with them throughout each procedure; handing instruments when needed; mixing the necessary materials; and ensuring that all instruments and materials are ready for use. When a dentist and dental assistant work together the procedure can be accomplished efficiently in a short period of time.

Dental assistants have many duties and work in many different types of dental practices. They take x-rays, place sealants, apply fluoride, and polish teeth in pediatric practices. They adjust appliances and take and pour impressions, trim models, take photographs, and expose x-rays in orthodontic practices. They can make temporary crowns, assist with taking impressions, and pour models in prosthodontic practices. They assist with surgical procedures in periodontic and oral surgery practices. No matter where they work, dental assistants are responsible for educating the patients about caring for the oral cavity before and after dental procedures.

Dental assistants can become certified by taking a national test administered by the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB). Certification through DANB is accepted throughout the United States. The Certified Dental Assistant (CDA) maintains her certification by taking twelve (12) hours of continuing education a year. By becoming a CDA the dental assistant is demonstrating a commitment to the profession, his or her co-workers, and patients.



To become a dental assistant you can be on-the-job trained, but many dentists do not have the time or the inclination to train their assistants. They prefer to hire an assistant who has completed an ADA accredited program. The American Dental Association (ADA), dentistry's professional organization, has set up accreditation guidelines for dental assisting programs. These programs are required to follow the guidelines and must be reviewed every seven years by the ADA to maintain their accreditation. If you are interested in a challenging career where you can be a counselor, educator, and highly skilled assistant to a dedicated health professional, please contact an ADA accredited program for more information.
